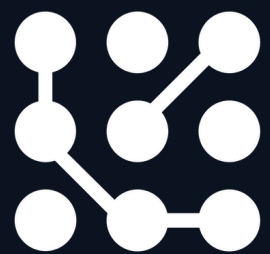

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# Medical Cost Projection Assessment & Physician Review

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Patient: Jane Doe

Date of Incident (DOI): February 13<sup>th</sup>, 2024

Date of Review: July 10<sup>th</sup>, 2024

Jane Doe, a 44-year-old office manager, was the restrained driver in a low-speed rear-end collision on February 13, 2024. Before the accident, Ms. Doe was healthy, active, and managed mild seasonal allergies, but had no chronic pain. Following the collision, she experienced neck stiffness, mild headaches, and intermittent right shoulder pain.

This report provides a chronological summary of Jane Doe's medical records following a motor vehicle accident (MVA) on February 13<sup>th</sup>, 2024. The focus is on diagnoses, treatment plans, and their causal connection to the accident, followed by an executive summary including a chronological list of diagnosis codes and projected future medical expenses for the next five years.

# Chronological Summary of Medical Visits

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## 02/13/24 - Urgent Care

Ms. Doe presented within 2 hours of the accident, complaining of neck pain, headache, and “tightness” in her right shoulder.

Physical exam: Decreased range of motion in cervical spine, no neurological deficits, mild tenderness over right trapezius.

Diagnosis: Cervical strain, right shoulder strain.

Treatment: Prescribed ibuprofen, muscle relaxant, and advised to follow up with PCP.

## 02/17/24 - Primary Care Physician (PCP)

Persistent neck pain, now radiating slightly to right shoulder - no numbness or tingling. Mild sleep disturbance from discomfort.

Referred for physical therapy (PT), and ordered cervical spine X-rays (**no fracture**).

## 02/22/24 – Physical Therapy Evaluation

Initial evaluation: Neck flexion/extension reduced by 25%, mild trigger points right upper trapezius.

Plan: 2x/week for 4 weeks, focus on gentle stretching and range-of-motion.

## 03/01/24, 03/08/24, 03/15/24 – Follow-up PT

Documented gradual improvement in range of motion and pain scores (7/10 → 3/10 over 3 weeks).

Discharge: “Tolerating daily activities, minor discomfort persists after prolonged computer use.”

## 03/20/24 – PCP

Re-evaluation. Symptoms nearly resolved; advised to continue home exercise program.
